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
World Book Day 2025

[']World Book Day' is fast approaching and we are busy planning our annual [']Book Week' in school, which will run from Monday 3rd March through to Friday 7th March. Although Thursday 6th March is officially World Book Day, we will be holding book-related activities throughout the entire week.

The theme for this year focuses on: **Read Your Way**, celebrating the reading that your child chooses to do in their free time without judgement. **Read Your Way** encourages everyone to let go of reading pressures and expectations, and lets children find fun in reading.

I am excited to tell you that we have been invited to take part in a performance poetry competition, which is being hosted at King's Meadow Primary School in Bicester. In preparation for this, we will be having a focus on poetry as part of our World Book Day celebrations. Reading, learning by heart, and reciting poetry is a fun way to share some of our favourite poems with each other. By adding in expression, actions and props, we can really make poems entertaining and engaging for an audience. During World Book Week, the children will have the opportunity to work on some performances in small groups and each class will have its own mini performance competition. The winning groups will then also be asked to share their poetry performance during Collective Worship.

There will be House Points and certificates on offer, and some children will be given the chance to go through to the final at King's Meadow School. To make this event even more exciting, there will be a group of judges to impress and medals to be won!

Please see the poems, which have been selected by your child's class teacher and sent home with your child. Please help your child to start learning **one** of them at home to give them a head start before World Book Week. In class, they will then begin to look at how to create a performance, but it is really helpful if the children already have some recollection of the poems.

Have fun and we look forward to seeing these poems come to life!
