



Apostrophes to show possession: Top tip: Remember, if the noun **does not** end with the letter s (*singular noun*), you will need to **add an apostrophe, then the letter s**.

If the noun **does** end with the letter s (*plural noun*), then you insert the **apostrophe after the letter s**.
